OPS #5 DETHRONED AFTER FOUR YEARS AS CANOE CHAMPIONS

In an incredible four-weeks of canoe races: old race times were smashed, traditional championship teams unseated, and over a thousand cast members showed up for work slightly bleary-eyed. And in the end, a jubilant Facilities Mixed team went all the way to take the Canoe Challenge of the World!

The action all began months ago as cast members from across Walt Disney World began forming teams to compete in our 1977 Canoe Races. For the fifth year, this traditional event was held on a 1,000 meter course layed out around the Rivers of America in Frontierland.

Friends and co-workers began pooling together to create ten-member teams to compete in one of three categories . . . Men, Women, and Mixed. Official rosters were filed with Cast Activities and the practicing was on!

Sometimes with the sun not even over the horizon, and smoky clouds of thick fog drifting over the course; hoarse calls of "stroke ... stroke" could be heard throughout Frontierland by midnight shift crews as canoe teams stormed the 1,000 meters as early as 6

Then the races began in earnest. Crew members were finalized, tee-shirts emblazoned with team names and logos were

distributed, and stop watches clicked. And hundreds of cast members began showing up for work with sore muscles.

For many, the Canoe Races are a good time ... putting a team together for some good natured competition before work, a great way to wake up and get your morning rolling. But for others, the Canoe Races are a serious athletic challenge. Teams are drawn not by friendship, but potential humanhorsepower bent over a paddle. Strategy sessions are held, captains observe power and weak sides to align paddlers for optimum strength and endurance, near scientific calculations are made for turning the four-corners of the course. Their goal was four-weeks away at a victory breakfast to award a huge trophy to the fastest team.

The time trials were soon underway, with each division competing on different inornings before the Magic Kingdom opened to our guests. The ten-member teams were vying for a spot in the semi-finals, digging deep into the Rivers of America with their paddles to propel the 22-foot long, one-ton canoes around the course in a musclescorching burst of power.

In the Men's Division, 13 teams were entered; racing against the stop watch through the time trials and semi-finals, with the top four surviving to go on to the finals.

For the past four years, a powerful Ops #5 team of all men has won the race, posting a faster time every year. If any record was thought to be out of reach, it was an incredible four-minutes and 31-seconds even they reached last year. Many felt that after four years of "fine-tuning" a team, Ops #5 had reached human limits. Not so, for in early time trials, team captain Butch Watson and his all-male River Rats came within 2/10th of a second . . . posting a 4:31.2 trip around the river! In the finals of the Men's Division, the River Rats came in at 4:33.6, "psyching" them up to come back a few days later in the divisional championships with a recordbreaking 4:29.8, a little over a second under Ops #5's previous record! The impossible had been done!

And it wasn't just a boat ride for the River Rats either, their competition in the Men's Division was stiff. . . Industrial Engineering moved into the finals with a 4:40 flat, finishing at 4:45.0, WED Design took a solid third place with a 4:50.6 in the finals, and Pinocchios qualified fourth entering the finals with

a 4:47.8, only to slip up to 5:01.0 on their last run.

The Mixed Division has traditionally been our largest, with this year's race proving to be no exception. Thirty-two teams began the time trials, vying for the top four places against the likes of last year's Mixed Champs, Watercraft.

Dave Gibson's 1977 Watercraft team gave fair notice by breaking their own record set last year, pulling across the finish line with a 4:43.7, less than a half-second under last year's 4:44.1. The Facilities Mixed team, a Rob Mitchell production, came on strong to qualify for second place. . . and all of this in only the semi-finals! It sooned turned into a real "canoe jam" with no less than four teams finishing within 1.1 seconds apart! These included Empress Lilly at 5:14.3, Disney University at 5:15.1, Star Ship Vista at 5:15.2, and Polynesian Pirates at 5:15.4.

Under a rule of the race, though seldom used, the top five teams going into the finals may be expanded to accommodate additional teams finishing within 1.5 seconds of each other. . . causing this year's Mixed Division finals to include seven teams!

In the Mixed Division finals, here is the order of finish. . . the Facilities Mixed team at 4:47.0, Watercraft at 4:48.7, Disney University at 5:07.2, WED Design at 5:13.7, Polynesian Pirates at 5:19.3, Empress Lilly at 5:27.6, and Star Ship Vista with a disappointing 6:42.5.

Fielding teams in the Women's Division, it was no surprise when last year's champion-ship Trammies team again won in the semi-finals. However, the surprise was when they beat their old record of 5:30.3 by pulling down a fast 5:11.4 for a new divisional record! A solid Pinocchios team of gals placed second in the semi-finals with a 5:21.0, the Travel Company gang came in at 5:29.6, and CRO's Crew at 5:56.7 for the top four places.

But, oh those finals. . . Pinocchios pulled ahead with a surprise 5:12.5 to win the Women's Division (although Watercraft set the record time), with the Trammies only managing second place with a 5:14.4, CRO's Crew took third with 5:31.6, and the Travel Company gals fourth at 5:34.2.

With the semi-finals and finals behind them, the Canoe Challenge of the World was set for center stage.

The day was Thursday, August 11th. The time was 6:30 am. . . still pitch dark on the Rivers of America. Standing nervously about the dock, bailing every last drop of water out of the canoes while waiting for dawn's first light so the cameras could record the race, 30 racers and their supporters milled about. They were Men's Division champions River Rats, Mixed Division champions Facilities Mixed, and Women's Division champs Pinocchios. A handicap system had been calculated by Chief Race Official Thom Murphy of Cast Activities, and the three teams were waiting to race each other against the clock for the title of Canoe Champions of the World!

Mere minutes before seven, the sun broke through and the signal was given by Thom for the first team to line up for the start. The Pinocchios gals moments later were off and running, finishing with a 5:14.1 real time, down to 4:30.4 with the handicap.

Next to paddle was Facilities Mixed, who crossed the finish with a fine 4:43.5, down to

4:26.5 with the handicap.

Then it was time for the River Rats, so far the fastest team to travel the Rivers of America, as proven in the finals with a 4:29.8.

The odds were on their winning.

But expect the unexpected with "sure things"... because as the River Rats powered into the first right-hand curve, a point that strategy sessions had called for paddlers to switch sides of the canoe, one man slid across the seat too hard in an effort not to miss a stroke... and slid completely out of the canoe! As he headed for shore with his paddle tucked under one arm, the now nine-man canoe continued on, crossing the finish line with an excellent 4:34.3... good, but not good enough to win.

The following morning, at a victory breakfast at the Contemporary Resort, Facilities Mixed with their handicapped final time of 4:26.5 became our official Canoe Champions of the World for 1977.

15th DISNEY FOUNDATION **SCHOLARSHIPS**

The Disney Foundation is pleased to announce its 15th Annual College Scholarship Program this week.

The program is open to all high school seniors who are children of qualified employees of Walt Disney Productions and associated companies, and who will be graduating from high school in either the Spring or Summer of 1978. This includes a stepchild or adopted child if claimed as a dependent on the parent employee's Federal Income Tax Return.

To qualify a child, the parent must be a full-time regular employee (permanent, 20 hours or more per week) of Walt Disney Productions or its domestic subsidiaries or associated companies, working in the United States. Also, the parent must have completed at least one-year of continuous service with the company since his or her most recent hire date by October 1, 1977, and be on the payroll the date the scholarship is awarded.

The deadline date for returning your Application is October 1, 1977.

Applications and information booklets concerning our College Scholarship Program are available through the Disney University, located in The Center.
